## LIVING WITH DOGS

## Barking

Barking problems are among the most common complaints that dog owners have. Why do dogs bark?

Well for a variety of reasons. Dogs will bark if they feel threatened. They may bark when they play and get excited. Some dogs will bark for attention. Some will bark if they are in pain and they'll even bark when they're lonely, bored or stressed. Certain breeds are also genetically inclined to bark more than others.

How you'll prevent or resolve your dog's barking issue will partially depend on what is triggering your dog to bark. If your dog is barking through the front window as dogs or people pass by your house, then blocking off access to the window is a simple way to help prevent his barking.

Keep in mind that the more your dog practices barking,



the better he'll get at it. So first you must identify what is triggering your dog to bark. Then you must remove the trigger or try to stop the barking before it occurs.

Dogs who are left outside for long periods of time are often the worst offenders of barking. Your dog needs to play with you and feel like he is a part of the family. Dogs typically don't do well when left alone for long periods of time. Make sure to set aside time for regular walks, playtime and training sessions. You'll want to be sure that you give him the social contact that he needs to keep his body and mind occupied.

## HERDING BREEDS

Herding breeds such as German Shepherds, Australian Shepherds, Australian Cattle Dogs, Collies, Sheepdogs and Corgi's have a strong inclination to herd livestock.

They are bred to run and work for hours at a time. Hereditary behaviors of herding dogs include barking, nipping/ biting, chasing or a combination of all of these in order to control their herd.

These dogs require abundant exercise and don't do well in sedentary households or apartment life. Herding dogs also love to bark and chase small moving objects.

Consider whether they will be a good fit for your current lifestyle if your household includes small children and/ or other small animals.

#### YOUR DOG: IS IT A TRAINING OR BEHAVIOR ISSUE?

Not all behavior issues can be "fixed" with training. Normal doggy behaviors that can become problematic for owners may include digging, pulling on leash, barking, chasing, jumping, and chewing (of course there are many more!).

Training can address many normal problem behaviors, However, when these or other "normal" behaviors occur with such frequency or intensity that they interfere with your dog's normal functioning and/ or create serious safety issues for people or animals in the family, your dog is in need of a behavior consultation.

Group basic obedience clas-

ses utilize training techniques to help humans more clearly communicate desired behavior cues to their dogs (e.g. sit, down, come, stay, walk politely on leash). But can not address dysfunctional or abnormal behaviors.

These dysfunctional or abnormal behaviors might include: fears, phobias, anxiety, aggression and separation issues that manifest themselves as problem behaviors.

In these cases a behavior consultation is in order. A professional who offers behavior consultations must have an understanding of basic learning theory, operant conditioning, training skills, and how to utilized behavior modification to change both your dog's behavioral response (their actions) to a situation, and to treat the underlying emotional state of your dog.

If you're unsure whether your dog's is in need of training or behavior modification seek the advice of your vet or a certified professional dog trainer (CPDT-KA).



#### BAD BREATH IN DOGS

Does your dog's bad breath make you cringe when he gives your face a slobbery kiss?

Bad breath is a common but highly treatable problem in dogs. The smell, caused by bacteria in your dog's mouth, stomach, or lungs, most often signals a dental or gastric issue. Don't' assume that unpleasant "dog breath" is normal and something you have to live with. Think of your dog's oral hygiene as you would your own: An integral part of daily well-being and long-term health. Here are some prevention tips:

- Feed your dog highquality food.
- 2. Brush your dog's teeth

inappropriate for most kinds of barking problems. In fact, they often make the problem worse!

Barking when left alone may also indicate a behavioral problem such as separation anxiety. If you think that anxiety is the source of your dog's barking, basic training will not address the issue. Contact a professional dog trainer (CPDT-KA) who has a background in both behavior and training issues for a consultation to get to the root of the matter.

You may also want to consult with your veterinarian to be sure your dog does not have an underlying medical issue.



### NEW DOG? HERE'S WHAT TO EXPECT

When you first get your dog, he will spend the first few days just trying to get adjusted. This is the "honeymoon phase". If your dog has any bad habits from his previous home, these may not appear for the first few weeks.

Potty mistakes can be avoided by limiting house freedom. This way you can keep an eye on your new dog constantly so he can't make a mistake.

This will also help your dog avoid the mistake of chewing on something he should not. Your dog doesn't know which things are his chew toys and which aren't. Keeping a close eye on him will give you the opportunity to redirect your dog to something he can chew on.

If your new dog is between 6– 18 months (depending on the dog) he is in his "teenage phase". This is typically when a dog will test his limits—and you! This is normal, just be consistent.

Set consistent house rules: decide as a family what the rules are and enforce them from the beginning.

Establish a routine. Dogs respond well to routines. They thrive on knowing what to expect. So while they're adjusting try to keep their meals,

### HOUNDS FOR THE HOLIDAYS!

Holiday times can be stressful for your dog. With some advanced planning and a little training, you can make things more fun for Fido and less stressful for you.

Keep in mind that dogs can be very sensitive to changes in their environment and routines. When family members take time off from work and school and/or house guests come to stay, try to preserve a few of your dog's routines, such as regular meal schedules, walks, and play sessions.

If your dog is excitable or anxious, he might benefit from an over-the-counter remedy such as "Composure" "Rescue Remedy" or "Comfort Zone DAP". You should also have a designated space and preplanned quiet times for your dog to relax.

- 2. Regularly. Every day is ideal; twice a week is a minimum for dogs
- Give your dog hard chew toys. Chewing is nature's teeth-cleaning tool for dogs.
- Use a breath improvement product made especially for dogs Good ones do exist, but do your research so you don't buy something that's essentially an ex-

pensive dog biscuit and nothing more.

Finally, be aware that a sudden or unusually foul breath, can indicate a seriously illness. In this case, it is important to pay a visit to your veterinarian as soon as possible.
